



A system of government in which the power and authority

What is a government and how does it work?

A government can be defined as a set of organizations, with their associated rules and procedures, that has the authority to exercise the widest scope of power --the ability to impose its will on others to secure desired outcomes--over a defined area.

What is government authority?

Government authority includes the power to have the final say over when the use of force is acceptable, and governments seek to exercise their authority with legitimacy. This is a complex definition, so this section unpacks its elements one by one.

What is authority in law?

Authority is the permission, conferred by the laws of a governing regime, to exercise power. Governments most often seek to authorize their power in the form of some decree or set of decrees--most often in the form of a legal constitution that sets out the scope of the government's powers and the process by which laws will be made and enforced.

What is a republic government system?

Republic In a republic government system, the power also rests with the people, as they are in charge of electing or choosing the country's leader, instead of the leader being appointed or inheriting power. Broadly defined, a republic is a government system without a monarch.

What is a political system?

Still more broadly defined, the political system is seen as a set of "processes of interaction" or as a subsystem of the social system interacting with other nonpolitical subsystems, such as the economic system. This points to the importance of informal sociopolitical processes and emphasizes the study of political development.

What are the 5 most common government systems?

Today, the five most common government systems include democracy, republic, monarchy, communism and dictatorship. This list details what to know about each. Democracy A democracy can be defined as a government system with supreme power placed in the hands of the people. It can be traced back to as early as the fifth century B.C.

How does the distribution of national and state power in a unitary system compare to that of a federal system of government? 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Federalism is a hierarchical system of government under which two levels of government exercise a range of control over the same geographic area. This system of exclusive and shared powers is the opposite of "centralized" forms of governments, such as those in England and France, under which the national government maintains exclusive power ...

Rational-Legal Authority. If traditional authority derives from custom and tradition, rational-legal authority derives from law and is based on a belief in the legitimacy of a society's laws and rules and in the right of leaders to act under these rules to make decisions and set policy. This form of authority is a hallmark of modern democracies, where power is given to people elected by ...

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A well-known concept derived from the text and structure of the Constitution is the doctrine of what is commonly called separation of powers. The Framers' experience with the British monarchy informed their belief that concentrating distinct governmental powers in a single entity would subject the nation's people to arbitrary and oppressive government action. 1 Footnote

Consequently, power is necessary for authority, but it is possible to have power without authority. In other words, power is necessary but not sufficient for authority. As you'll learn in this section, Max Weber studied power and authority, differentiating between the two concepts and formulating a system for classifying types of authority.

Aristocracies and Caste Systems. Ruling authority in an aristocracy is in the hands of a small number of individuals considered to be elite members of society. Similar to monarchy, an aristocracy is determined through lines of succession. Generally, the higher a person's class, the closer they get to the actual seat of power.

From these social hierarchies arise a system of political obligations from which rulers and their governments derive power and authority. A classic example of a class system is found in *The Republic*, when Plato divides society into five classes of citizens: agricultural or industrial producers, sailors and shipowners, merchants (i.e. ...

The judicial branch also plays an important role in the checks and balances system, as it has the power to declare laws unconstitutional and to interpret the Constitution and federal law. ... The concept of checks and balances is an integral part of the United States' democratic system. The three branches of government are designed to check ...

Government refers to the system by which a state or community is controlled, while authority denotes the power or right to give orders and enforce obedience. ... A key distinction lies in the source and scope of government and authority. Governmental power is structured and sanctioned through formal political processes and institutions, whereas ...

Politics refers to the distribution and exercise of power within a society, and polity refers to the political institution through which power is distributed and exercised. In any society, decisions must be made regarding the allocation of resources and other matters. Except perhaps in the simplest societies, specific people and often specific organizations make these decisions.

Instead of placing authority in the hands of one person, like a king, or even a small group of people, the U.S. Constitution divides power. Power is first divided between the national, or federal government, and the state and local government under a system known as Federalism.

Unitary state, a system of political organization in which most or all of the governing power resides in a

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centralized government. In a unitary state, the central government commonly delegates authority to subnational units and channels policy decisions down to ...
