

# Define social power system

What is social power based on?

Social power is used to exert control over others according to the interests and motivations of the person (s) in power. Generally, social power is characterized by tradition, charisma, and rational-legal authority. Power obtained by tradition is naturally hierarchical, while one's charm and personality influence charisma.

What is power in sociology?

power, in political science and sociology, the capacity to influence, lead, dominate, or otherwise have an impact on the life and actions of others in society. The concept of power encompasses, but is not limited to, the notion of authority. Unlike authority, which implies legitimacy, power can be exercised illegitimately.

What are the characteristics of social power?

Generally, social power is characterized by tradition, charisma, and rational-legal authority. Power obtained by tradition is naturally hierarchical, while one's charm and personality influence charisma. Rational-legal authority is based on the laws and rules of a society. Social power is constituted by legal and legitimate authority.

How does social power affect society?

What is authority based social power?

Authority-based social power arises from an individual's position within a social structure, such as a boss in a workplace, a teacher in a classroom, or a government official. People with authority often have the power to make decisions, enforce rules, and allocate resources, which can influence the behavior of those under their jurisdiction.

Why is social power important?

Social power can also arise from an individual's relationships, connections, or social network within a community. People who are well-connected or have strong ties to influential figures may be able to leverage these relationships to influence others, gain access to resources, or shape social norms and values.

Basic principles of social power all follow from power as control over valued resources. To analyze power we must define it. Definitions of power as influence define power by its effect. Others have defined power as

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potential influence. Others have dropped influence from the definition of power altogether and have homed in on power as resource or outcome control.

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Factors that define stratification vary in different societies. In most societies, stratification is an economic system, based on wealth, the net value of money and assets a person has, and income, a person's wages or investment dividends. While people are regularly categorized based on how rich or poor they are, other important factors influence social standing.

Social institutions are the organizations in society that influence how society is structured and functions. They include family, media, education, and the government. A social institution is an established practice, tradition, behavior, or system of roles and relationships that is considered a normative structure or arrangement within a society.

2 | THE POWER TO DEFINE RESILIENCE Power has long been the subject of intense debate in the social sciences. There is no consensus on the precise definition of power. Despite constant disagreement over what power is, scholars agree that power is central to the interactions between humans and their environment.

For centuries, philosophers, politicians, and social scientists have explored and commented on the nature of power. Pittacus (c. 640-568 B.C.E.) opined, "The measure of a man is what he does with power," and Lord Acton perhaps more famously asserted, "Power tends to corrupt; absolute power corrupts absolutely" (1887).

2. Power "over" versus power "to" Even if one holds that power is exercised rather than possessed (Foucault [Citation 1977]2002), the question remains what is exercised; is it a capacity "to" act and achieve something, or is it a social relationship in which A exercises power "over" B?
